

Kalamatiya - The Birds





Kalamatiya on the southern coast is well known as a bird sanctuary recording many species of birds, of which 54 are migratory, offering a biologically rich and ecologically diverse experience to the serious bird watcher and discerning traveller.

There are four nationally threatened birds found within the Sanctuary - Indian Reef Heron, Glossy Ibis,



Sri Lankan Jungle Fowl and Black-capped Purple Kingfisher. The Sri Lankan Jungle Fowl is the Sri Lankan National Bird and is the only endemic bird.

There are 38 species of reptiles, a large number of which are nationally and globally threatened.



41 species of fish are in the waters.



20 species of mammals also live there including 4 endemic mammals: a Shrew, the Toque Macaque, a Spiny Rat and a Tree Mouse.



A large number of plants are recorded.

In 1938, the bird sanctuary was declared a wildlife sanctuary but this was abolished in 1946 to be redeclared in 1984.



Karukalli Saltern, the Lunama and Kalamatiya lagoons and the surrounding marshy areas are within the sanctuary and offer a unique paddling experience to view the abundant birds and wildlife.
